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FOUNDERS' NOTE

Warm Greetings!

After months of uncertainty it is a pleasure to connect with Ek Tara's friends and well wishers. Year 2020-2021 was one of unprecedented challenge for us, as the COVID-19 pandemic led to a sudden closure of all education institutes around the world. However, we were able to pivot and cope to meet the needs of the situation because of the support from partner organizations, donors and well-wishers. After months of running a unique project based tele learning engagement project for our children, in November 2020 we decided to reopen the Learning Center in a staggered manner maintaining all COVID-19 protocols. This was necessary as most of our students had connectivity issues therefore were unable to complete their work remotely and the learning gaps being created by the closure of schools was widening at an alarming rate.

We took this opportunity to assess our students' present levels of learning viz-a-viz the expected Literacy and Numeracy levels in order to identify the needs of each child, and develop a modified curriculum to bridge the gaps. This entire process was aided by experts in the field.

Amidst the gloom however the most exciting, and a dream come true for us, was the formal launch of the state-of the-art Ek Tara Learning Centre (ELC) in March 2021. Spread over 3 floors and an open terrace, the Centre has 22 large classrooms, provision for an integrated Science, Art and Math (STEAM) lab, an art room, music room, library, multipurpose hall, indoor games room and a sick room.

The Pandemic and subsequent lockdown pushed families of our students deeper into poverty. Earning members lost jobs and there were no opportunities for alternate employment. Right from the first lockdown, Ek Tara intervened to provide dry rations, masks and sanitizers, and worked with local civic authorities to distribute cooked meals in the area. Through our community kitchen, we also served cooked meals for factory workers in the vicinity. Ek Tara's community leaders worked round the clock in the slums to generate awareness, while our women from the vocational training unit stitched masks on a large scale for distribution across different slum communities of the city.

Aside from the urgent interventions Ek Tara ran both online and in person trainings on soft skill development, tailoring, housekeeping and computer literacy, to build the capacity of our community leaders.
We cherish all our partners and take this opportunity to thank each and every one of our well wishers, donors, volunteers and every member of the Ek Tara team who helped us tide over this most challenging year.
Despite the ups and downs, Ek Tara has emerged stronger than before with an even deeper commitment to providing quality education for all the children under our care. Through our Learning centre and all other support programs, our endeavour is to adapt to the "new normal" and to make learning relevant, well rounded, experiential for all our children and to prepare them for a bright secure future inspite of all odds further highlighted by the pandemic!

EDUCATION

The year started with our regular plans of running the various projects of Early Childhood Learning Centre, Primary and Middle School with over 800 children. In addition the mobile school project with its partnership with KMC schools reached out to over 400 students.



All our programmes are aligned to several of the UN SDG's (namely 4, 8, 10) and we work extensively with partners around the world, who believe in elevating the position of women in society through Education and Skill Building.

However in the month of March 2020, the COVID 19 pandemic created an unprecedented challenge, leading to closures of schools and other educational institutes. To overcome this challenge and to maintain the continuity of learning, in our children, Ek Tara partnered with Education Above All, a Qatar based organization and implemented their pilot on Project Based Learning. Ek Tara accessed the projects from their Internet Free Education Resource Bank(IFERB) developed by EAA's Innovative Development Directorate.



The students were divided into age groups of 4-6 years, 7-10 years and 11- 13 years. Each of the teachers had no more than 20 children in their group. The Projects covered subjects such as Literacy and Numeracy and were adapted to the needs of the students. The Lesson Plans developed, for five days in a week, included day wise activities. The teachers explained the project activities over whatsapp and voice messages. The projects also provided an opportunity for the involvement of parents and siblings. The projects were monitored through feedbacks from students, teachers and parents and were shared with EAA on a regular basis.



HYBRID LEARNING SOLUTIONS

In the month of November 2020, we decided to open our new 17 000 square feet Learning Centre. The ELC (Ek Tara Learning Centre) has enabled access to world class learning resources to children who otherwise are relegated to the bottom most rung of society. Equipped with teaching- learning resources which are essential for children today, to be future ready, the ELC has over 20 classrooms, provisions for STEM and Social Studies Lab, Library, Play zone, art room, music room, sick room and technology enabled hubs.

The Centre was opened in a staggered way for the children, maintaining COVID protocols, to not only provide a safety net for our children but also most were finding it difficult to complete their projects at home. This new space is spread over 3 floors with well aired classrooms, open terrace, an art room, music room, a library, an indoor game room, a sick room and a provision for an Integrated Science and Math (STEM) lab. The classrooms are equipped with digital learning resources.



THE ELC LAUNCH

The Ek Tara Learning Centre (ELC) was officially launched on 25th March 2021 by Mrs Devi Kar, Director Modern High School for Girls. The students also displayed their artwork at Ek Tara's annual Art Exhibition- Kalatmak. which was inaugurated by renowned sculptor and artist Mr. Narayan Sinha. The launch program which continued for four days was a walkthrough of the new space. The children show cased their talent through storytelling, music and dance and enthralled the audience. In addition there was a display of products from our vocational training unit. Ms Vartika Poddar also performed a special program with our girls from the community. Our Guests included eminent personalities from the field of education, parents of our children and family members of our teachers and staff.



ACADEMIC ASSESSMENTS TO DETERMINE LEARNING LOSS AND DEVELOP BESPOKE CURRICULUM

During this time "WeCan" Learning Resource Institute partnered with Ek Tara to enhance the learning outcomes at the primary school level. The partnership was not only to address the needs of the children with learning gaps but also to optimise the performance of the children. We have completed the first phase of assessment of children from classes I to VII to ascertain the present levels as against the expected levels in Literacy and Numeracy.



Education Above All (EAA): Our Tele Learning Project was possible due to our partnership with Internet Free Education Resource Bank (IFERB) developed by EAA's Innovative Development Directorate.

EAA further facilitated in developing partnerships for training of teachers on Tele Learning with Mantra4Change and on Social Emotional Learning with Dream a Dream Foundation.

Gopali Youth Welfare Society: Ek Tara collaborated in a teachers training program with Gopali Youth Welfare Society (GYWS), an NGO run by the students of IIT Kharagpur.

The objective of the training program was to train the teachers of Classes I to V, of their school, Jagriti Vidya Mandir, in improving teacher-student interaction through distance learning innovative projects. The training program was divided into two sessions from 4th to 6th July 2020 and 7th to 10th July 2020.

"RISE Online workshop 2020": was held from 5th September to 8th September 2020, which was organized in collaboration with IIT LIGHT centres, the expansion of RISE (Reform and Innovative Education), an initiative of Gopali Youth Welfare Society run by IIT Kharagpur. The LIGHT centres are run by IIT students across India.

The online workshop for various school teachers of LIGHT centres across the country. Ek Tara, given the experience and expertise in early childhood development, was invited to be the Trainers and conduct the sessions. The content included: Effect of pandemic in current school system, introduction to student centric learning, integrated teaching learning methodology, introduction to Lesson Plans and means of implementing it online, sample activities which teachers can implement online etc.

Civic Literacy Program: This program was initiated by Ms Ankhi Guhathakurta, a Phd scholar at the University of Pennsylvania. The project was developed for the adolescent girls at Ek Tara, in a way in which the youth understand their roles as citizens and make a meaning, about, for and within their socio political communities.

PARTNERSHIPS

- **SlumJam**: We introduced special music classes for our students in partnership with Slum Jam.
- White Hat Junior: for conducting coding classes for students of classes III and IV.
- **Camp K12:** conducted a variety of sessions on coding, art, speaking, maths and chess and also helped with the basic coding classes for 100 primary students.
- Talk To A Scientist: A Pune based program designed by two scientist that conducts interactive webinars for children aged between 6-16 years. Four students of class VII joined the weekly webinars and interacted with different scientists.
- Katha: conducted two workshops with Teachers and Community Leaders on how to create Reader Leaders, leading to 'Each Child Teach a Child'-Katha's theory of change. The second workshop was on strategies to create Master Student Librarians and on how to extend the Library to the community.
- Goethe Institute: conducted two workshops for Ek Tara's science teachers on Science and Sustainability. Further to the workshops students from class VI conducted two experiments one on making fireless, health snacks with eco-friendly packaging and in the other they made Turmeric Ph indicator strips, which they used on lemons to check the acidic nature. Both the experiments were highly appreciated.
- Think Arts: Conducted workshops on Art appreciation for children, challenges and solutions, Leaping out of Boxes, making teaching and learning innovative and Engage with senses.
- Strive to Thrive: An organisation that works with children from the marginalised community, around the world through various projects such as Chess, Photography, Maths, Science, English, Music, Computer, art classes etc. Strive to Thrive partnered with Ek Tara and conducted two programs in Chess and Photography with 15 student in each session.



NUTRITION, HEALTH & HYGIENE

This year the COVID-19 and the lock down situation rendered many people jobless and the poor economic conditions led to poor nutrition, health and hygiene status. To overcome the challenge, Ek Tara took initiatives to distribute the monthly ration kits to each family. Special Milk cartons were arranged for the Ek Tara students in the age group of 3-6 years. Ek Tara's Care givers and Support staff we part of the distribution team, maintaining COVID protocols. A special response team was set up where the families could contact immediately when the supplies were exhausted. In the month of November 2020, the Ek Tara Learning Centre opened with a terrace space, equipped with Mats, handwashing area, toilets and a separate space for self service counter for older children. The children came to the centre in a staggered way. Some students were provided with hot meals as they resumed classes for longer hours due to examination and for the rest cooked snacks and fruits were served. Milk. cooked snack. fruits and sweets were also served to the Montessori students.

Total Number of students covered under snack and meal plan everyday was around 900.

The Nutrition workshops were all postponed to the second quarter of the academic year due to the pandemic.



THE FAMILIES OF OUR STUDENTS AND THE COMMUNITY WERE LEAST PREPARED FOR COVID-19. THE BASIC NEEDS WERE IN SHORT SUPPLY AND SOMETIMES NON-EXISTENT. FURTHER, DUE TO SPACE CONSTRAINTS AND CONGESTED POPULATION MADE IT DIFFICULT FOR ANY KIND OF ISOLATION AND SOCIAL DISTANCING.

EKTARA, TO MITIGATE THE DIFFICULTIES, DEVELOPED STRATEGIES WHICH INCLUDED

- Generating awareness to the community, parents and students on maintaining COVID Safety through digital platform.
- Creation of Emergency Response Cell for any medical emergency needed during the lockdown period.
- Special counselling sessions conducted by reputed counsellor of Kolkata for the students who underwent mental trauma, domestic violence, physical and verbal abuse and other similar form of unrest at home during the lockdown period.
- Psychological support to the families.
- Distribution of hygiene kits to the families and generating awareness through digital workshops.
- First aid Training conducted by EkTara health workers for the caregivers.







THE HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

- Workshops with students and community trainees.
- Safety measures and management of COVID-19 for the front line workers -conducted by CII in association with UNICEF.
- Information on preventive health care on COVID 19- conducted by Narayana Health
- Training in House Keeping with special emphasis on cleanliness and usage of disinfectants conducted by Taj Bengal ,Kolkata
- Immunisation workshop with mothers of children studying in L1, L2 and L3 of the ECLC in phases conducted by the Ek Tara Health Worker.
- Training conducted with Mothers Forum on Government Health Schemes and on how to fill forms using computer and smart phones
- Child Care and Nutrition workshop held for mothers in batches, meeting conducted by Ms Vidhi Beri.
- Menstrual hygiene workshop for adolescents, conducted by Lions Club International and Green Pari
 (NGO)
- Eye camp conducted by Turnstone Global for the students of ECLC and Primary classes.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The pandemic led to a major economic setback with an estimated 400 million people in India at risk of falling into poverty. In April 2020, West Bengal alone, reported an estimated loss of 4,000 crore due to the virus triggered lockdown.

During this period, Ek Tara Community Engagement Programme implemented several relief and rehabilitation projects for the families. Each family was given a ration kit with Rice/ Ata / Dal/ oil/ Masala and Potato. Ek Tara also worked with local civic authorities and distributed cooked meals around the area and provided protection gears such as masks and sanitisers.



The rehabilitation projects were focused on skill development and providing income generation opportunities for women. During this period, Ek Tara initiated a variety of projects such as

Community Kitchen: Ek Tara set up a fully mechanised kitchen to provide healthy hygienic nutritious meals for children and other factory workers around the area. The kitchen is located at Ek Tara and managed by a team of 8 women who were trained over a period of 3 months on all functional areas of managing the kitchen such as - budgeting, procurement, using the equipment, cooking, cleaning and computers etc. The kitchen provides 500 cooked meals to children and over 100 cooked meals to workers around the area. It has the potential to produce up to 1500 meals.

Training and production on Masks and bags: The pandemic created a major health crisis in addition to economic and social challenges. Awareness and information on the virus was extremely limited especially among people from low income groups. Ek Tara immediately launched a project for production of masks on a large scale to ensure the safety of the families we work with .Through this project, Ek Tara provided income opportunity to over 20 women and reached out to over 10,000 individuals with masks and raised awareness on its use . Women also produced bags that were used for distribution of ration ensuring reduction in use of plastic.

Computer Training: In partnership with Aptech, Ek Tara provided training in basic certified computer course to 21 young girls from the community. The training will equip the girls to seek employment at a later date.

Tailoring Training: The pandemic led to loss of jobs which in turn resulted in women looking for opportunities to contribute towards the family income. Ek Tara organized an USHA certified tailoring course for 24 women from the community. These women were trained on products that responded well during the lockdown and generated opportunities for employment.

House Keeping training: Taj Bengal facilitated a training program on Housekeeping for 10 women at Ek Tara. The trainings was organized to enable better job opportunities for women. Upon completion of the training, all participants received a certificate.

Soft Skill Skill training: A training programme was held over 5 weeks, for 15 young community leaders on effective communication, office ethics & etiquette, discipline & decorum. This training was delivered to enhance their skills and enable them to undertake their roles and responsibilities, more efficiently within the organisation.



EVENTS AND PARTNERSHIPS

The lockdown has been been hardest on girls and women, particularly those living on the fringes of society. From domestic violence to human trafficking, child marriage to lost livelihoods, these already-vulnerable women have had to bear the brunt of the Pandemicinduced crisis. Ek Tara undertook several events to help women cope with these challenges

Ek Tara in partnership with **Kolkata Sanved** organised a workshop on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights. The workshop was held over 6 sessions, for 12 participants. The project applied Dance Movement Therapy as a tool for delivering these workshops.

Ek Tara partnered with **Swabhav** and formed a group 'Meyeder Ganer Dol' with 6 young girls from the community to develop a street plays. It is not only a platform for marginalized girls and women to come together and share their experiences through stories, songs and theatre but also an alternative livelihood option.

'Aao Bath kare' was held in partnership with **PARWARISH**, to generate awareness among mothers on child sexual abuse.





Since the end of March we have been working relentlessly to provide relief to over 10,000 families and cooked meals to 19,000 individuals. Given below are some highlights of the distributions done.

Opinion

1 Overview of the Trust's Operations

A registered Trust, Ek Tara began its journey in 2011 with the mission for providing high-quality holistic education to children and women of impoverished families to enable community transformation. As a part of its programme and projects, all beneficiaries, including those in the vocational training unit, have access to support programmes on health, hygiene, nutrition and skill building opportunities. Its aim is also to enable future generations of impoverished people to break out of the poverty enforced lack of education.

- 2 Accounting Policy
- 2.1 All grants are accounted on receipt and expenditure and liabilities are accounted /recognised on accrual basis. Grants / donations received towards the year end and not possible to be expended within the financial year, are treated as Advance donations and necessary applications as required under the Income Tax rules for deferment of expenditure to the next financial year are made by the Trust.
- 2.2 Grants /donations accepted / received towards implementation of various programmes for carrying out specific purposes are spent according to the direction of the donor agencies and unspent balances, if any, are dealt with in accordance with the instructions/arrangement with the donor agencies. Normally the donations are received to be spent within the financial years and so they are treated as income of the year when they are received, unless they are received at the year end and treated as "Advance donation".
- 2.3 Interest income is accounted on accrual basis.
- 2.4 Donations specifically received towards Corpus are added to the Trust fund and are separately disclosed.
- 2.5 Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition.
- Assets created out of a Project Grant are stated at cost of acquisition to the Trust. A Capital Fund is simultaneously created for the cost of asset created from Project Fund.
- 2.6 Depreciation Depreciation on fixed assets are provided on written down value method at rates provided in the Income Tax Act, 1961. Depreciation on the Assets created out of Project funds are 2.7 Disclosure and classification of expenditure
 - All expenditure incurred directly towards the charitable programmes of the Trust are disclosed as "Charitable Programme Expenses" and all other expenditure providing support to the programmes are All expenses are accounted for on accrual basis.

2.8 Employee benefits

Cost of short term employee benefits are recognised on accrual basis on the terms of the employment contract and other relevant compensation policies followed by the Trust. Leave is not accumulated and are allowed to be encashed within the financial year.
