In 2011, I found myself in an unexpected situation: a deep desire to meet a social need and a pressing urgency to change the lives of girls in underserved communities in Kolkata. Having grown up in privilege—something I cannot take credit for—I realized the importance of giving back. The support from my family has profoundly influenced my life and perspective since then. The work I undertake now is deeply personal and stands as the most vital aspect of my 61-year journey. I ventured beyond my comfort zone and confronted the realities of the city I cherish, which continues to challenge me daily to learn and do more.

In the last decade I have learnt a lot about the hardships of the communities we work with at Ek Tara, and this was made possible only because we became integrated into their lives. Harrowing stories of young girls that come to us leaves me shattered and makes us wonder how much it will take to see the change we want to see. The girls in these families have perseverance, intelligence, zest but lack opportunities. When I started Ek Tara with my friend Namrata, it was with the singular vision and need to provide basic education to children whose mothers appealed to us that their daughters should not have a repeat of their lives of oppression and subjugation. We wondered if others around us would join to help. We questioned how people do not get perturbed by the stark realities in the city, sometimes even on the same street. The singular vision has evolved and changed, the years of Covid being a big changemaker. We now emphasize on the development of the whole child, involving intellectual, emotional, social and physical growth.

Today after 10 years Ek Tara has evolved to have a life of its own. Several bumps on the road – but we come out unscathed, we do not give up. My journey has been driven by the belief that each child must live with respect and dignity and we all have a responsibility to ensure this – My team, supporters, volunteers are all driven by the same passion and their continuous support and interest is the backbone of this visible effort and change. We move towards reducing the gap between girls from mainstream society and underserved communities.

The plans for the next 10 years are believing that the extraordinary will happen. What will extraordinary mean for us is to be seen but through this we will have all our well wishers with us.

Thank you for being a part of our journey to build a world where every child receives an excellent education to realise their potential. With gratitude to all who have crossed my path since the beginning, to my family who has stood by me, and to my wonderful team without whom Ek Tara could not happen.

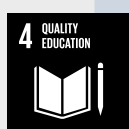

First Step 2011-2014

Ek Tara started with a creche and vocational training for women. The focus later shifted to education, leading to a programme for 300 children, along with health, hygiene, and nutrition initiatives.



Expansion 2015-2018

Ek Tara expanded by starting a Pre-Primary and Primary section and engaging more with the community. The student beneficiaries grew to over 800. A partnership with the Belgian organization Mobile School began in 2017 to reach more children.



OUR JOURNEY

Number of beneficiaries in 2020 across all our projects

Ek Tara distributed rations to families affected by the pandemic, including essential items like rice, lentils, flour, soaps, and masks. In addition, 700 kilos of Pediasure (1 kilo each) were given to children.



TLFMAS 7000 sq. ft. school which saw its official opening on 2 December 2022, offers classes in Art & Craft, Dance, DJ & Electronic Music, Photography, Music and Theatre to underprivileged children living in and around Topsia, Kolkata.

Government Partnerships 2024-2025

Collaborating with 28 government schools, we have reached over 3,000 children through this partnership.

Covid-19 and Welfare programme 2020-2021



Ek Tara concentrated on welfare programmes during the Covid-19 pandemic but returned to its primary educational initiatives as normalcy resumed. In 2021, we launched the Ek Tara Learning Centre (ELC) and the Ek Tara Community Centre (ECC) that same year.

Partnerships 2022-2023

Ek Tara partnered with Tomorrowland Foundation to establish the Music and Arts School (TLFMAS) for underprivileged children in Kolkata.



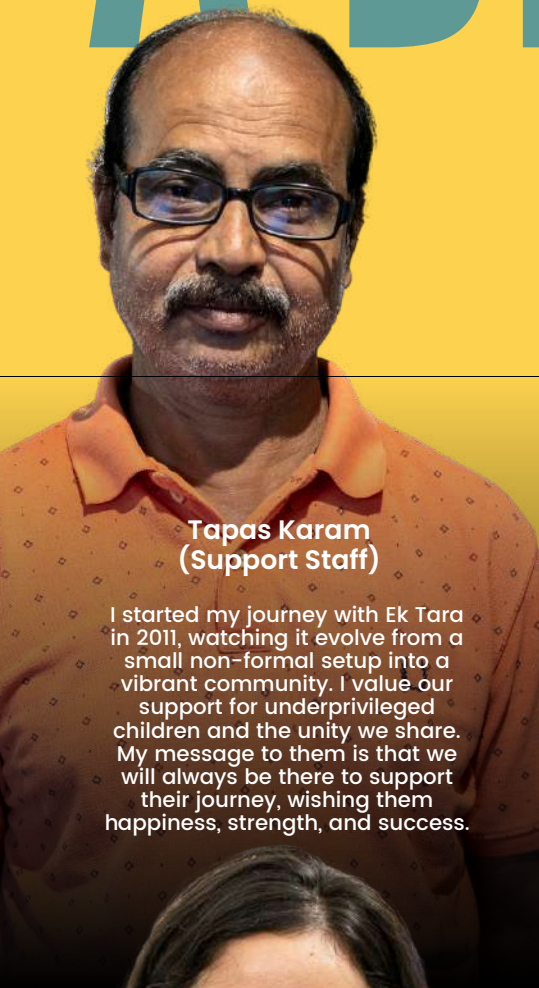

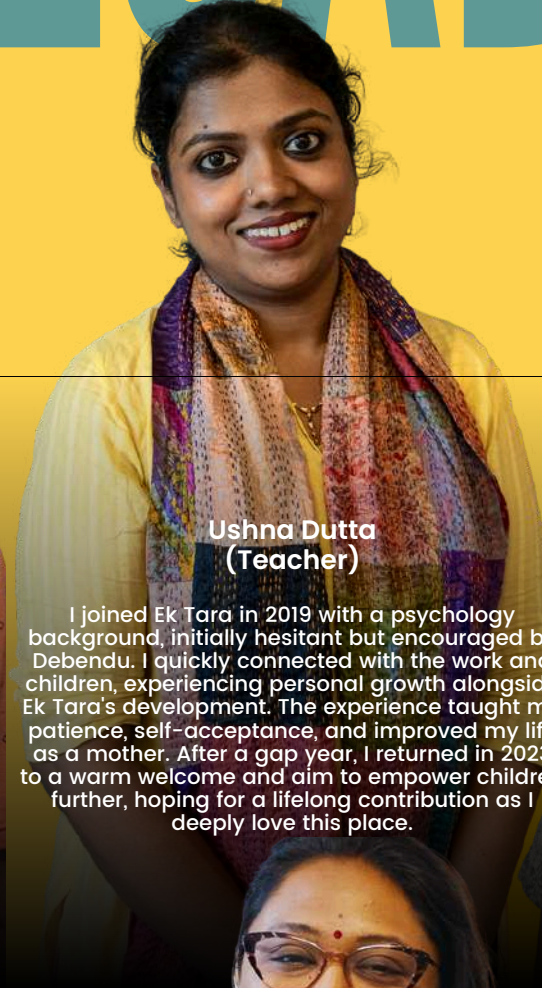
JOURNEY

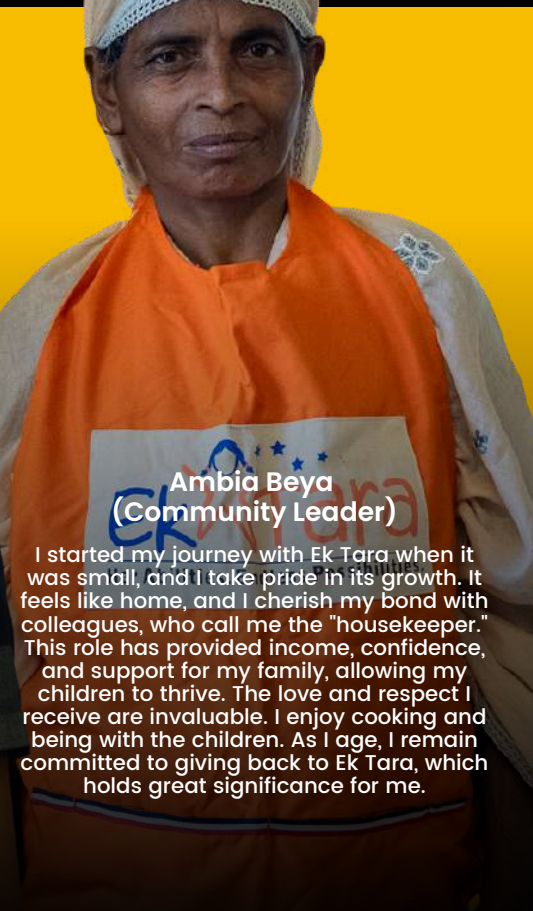
Sadaf Ambreen

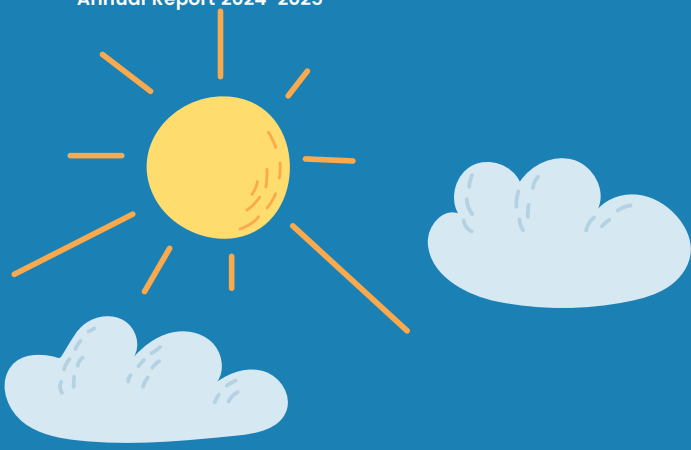

EK TARA LEARNING CENTRE (ELC)

The Ek Tara Learning Centre (ELC) offers a secure and enriching environment to our children within Ek Tara. It reaches out to students through various programmes such as the Early Years Programme, Primary Years Programme and Higher Education Programme. These initiatives provide customized academic support and co-curricular activities, fostering the comprehensive growth of each student.

Reaching to a student base exceeding 1100, the ELC features a well-equipped Resource Centre and hosts the Tomorrowland Foundation Music and Arts School. This facility encompasses provisions for arts, music, dance, and theatre. The centre boasts of modern classrooms, digital teaching aids, an integrated Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) Laboratory, a Computer Laboratory, and a Story Hub - the library.

LEARNING CENTRE AT A GLANCE

EARLY YEARS PROGRAMME (EYP)

The Early Years Programme reaches out to over 350 students in the age group of 3-7 years and is divided into Learning Level 1, 2 and 3 all the way to grade 2. The focus of EYP is to give the students it works with, skills in foundational literacy and numeracy, gross and fine motor skills and other developmental goals aligned with the National Education Policy (NEP). Our vision is to equip children from marginalized communities with the necessary skills to transition into primary school.



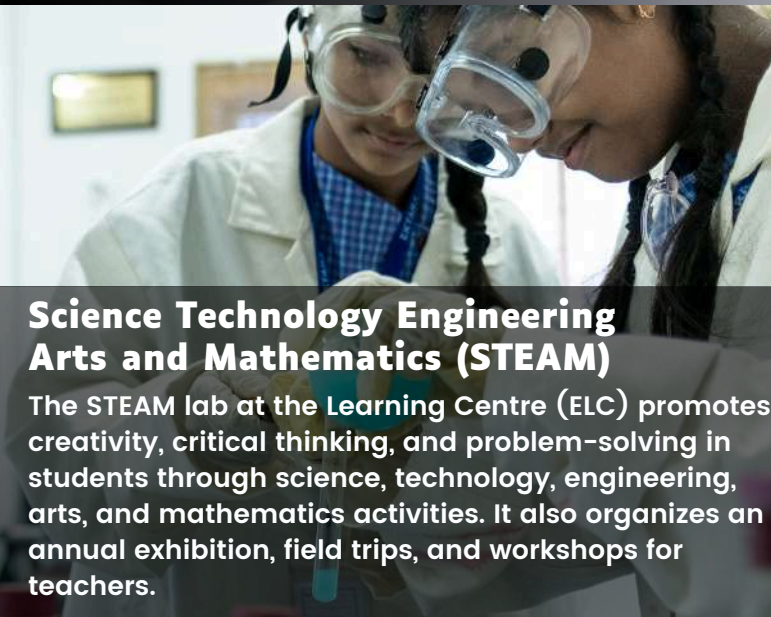
PRIMARY YEARS PROGRAMME (PYP)

The Primary Years Program includes grades 3 to 6, covering subjects such as Maths, English, Hindi, Science, and Social Studies, adhering to NCERT and NEP guidelines. Assessments occur twice a year, with regular class tests. Students enjoy computer classes, STEAM lab learning, remedial and spoken English, dance, and Karate. They also engage in activities at the Tomorrowland Foundation Music and Arts School, sports, and represent Ek Tara in various school programs, currently involving approximately 325 children.



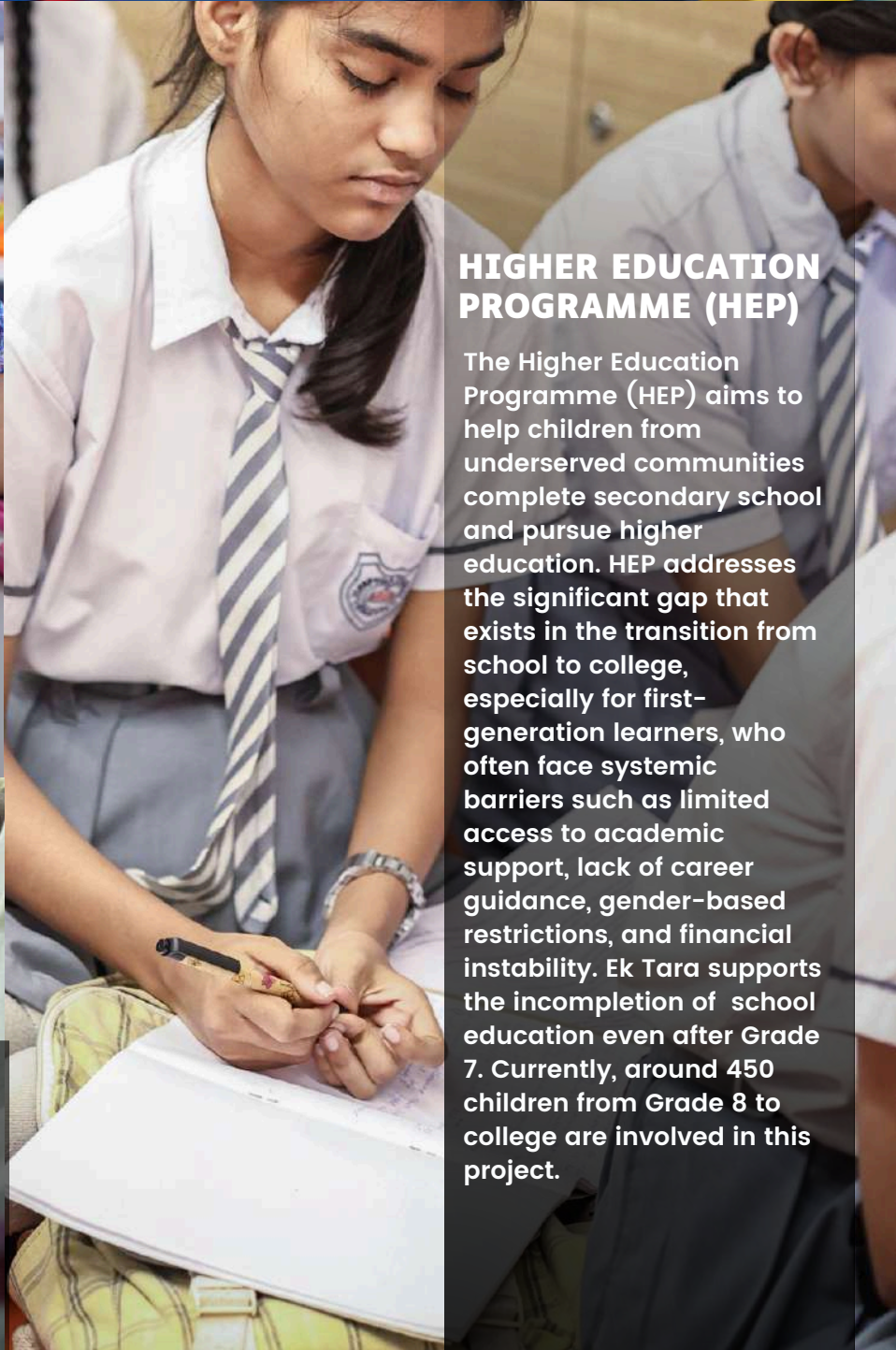
Science Technology Engineering Arts and Mathematics (STEAM)

The STEAM lab at the Learning Centre (ELC) promotes creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving in students through science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics activities. It also organizes an annual exhibition, field trips, and workshops for teachers.



HIGHER EDUCATION PROGRAMME (HEP)

The Higher Education Programme (HEP) aims to help children from underserved communities complete secondary school and pursue higher education. HEP addresses the significant gap that exists in the transition from school to college, especially for first-generation learners, who often face systemic barriers such as limited access to academic support, lack of career guidance, gender-based restrictions, and financial instability. Ek Tara supports the incompleteness of school education even after Grade 7. Currently, around 450 children from Grade 8 to college are involved in this project.



STORY HUB

Ek Tara and Bhabook launched 'Story Hub' at Ek Tara Learning Centre, featuring over 700 children's books and various literacy activities, including storytelling and paired reading. The library hosts thematic events, enhances social and emotional skills, and offers a Reading Foundation Programme for struggling readers. It aims to integrate storybooks into the classroom through activities like read-aloud sessions and book discussions.



DIGITAL LITERACY

Our labs at ELC are well-equipped for hands-on learning with desktops, laptops, tablets, and technology tools. First-generation learners benefit from computer skills, gamified learning, and project-based activities. New additions include Canva, algorithm flowcharts, Scratch, and HTML programming. Monitoring software tracks student progress. Students pursue certified courses from various institutions for computer skills.



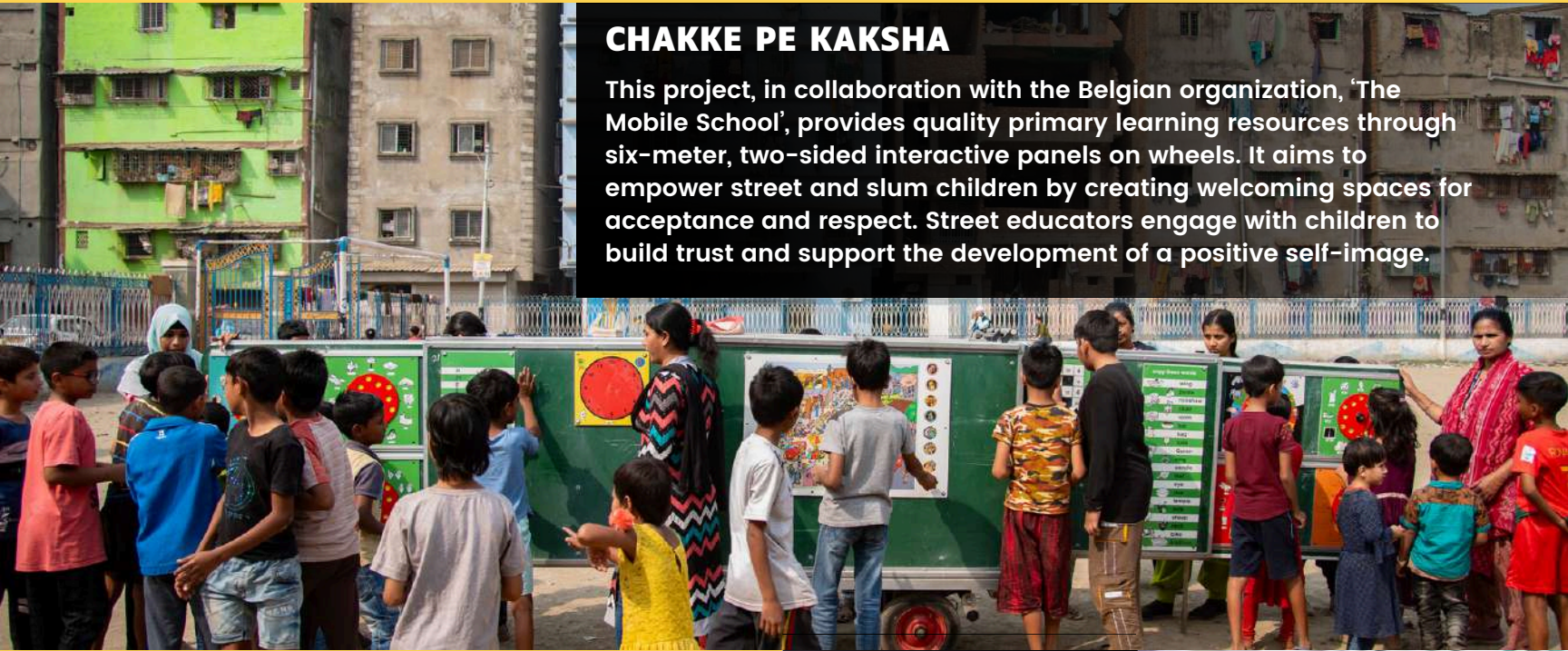
CHILD WELFARE AND PARENTAL ENGAGEMENT (CWPE)

The Child Welfare and Parental Engagement (CWPE) program at Ek Tara focuses on five core areas: Health and Well-being, Parental and Community Engagement, Child Safeguarding, Youth Empowerment, and Nutrition. Through preventive health initiatives, mental health support, capacity-building for parents and youth, daily nutrition, and a strong safeguarding framework, CWPE creates a safe, inclusive, and growth-oriented environment for over 1200 children. These integrated efforts support holistic child development and build strong, resilient families and communities.

OUR WORK WITH THE GOVERNMENT

CHAKKE PE KAKSHA

This project, in collaboration with the Belgian organization, 'The Mobile School', provides quality primary learning resources through six-meter, two-sided interactive panels on wheels. It aims to empower street and slum children by creating welcoming spaces for acceptance and respect. Street educators engage with children to build trust and support the development of a positive self-image.



KOLKATA MUNICIPAL CORPORATION MODEL SCHOOL

Ek Tara focuses on primary school students in grades 1 to 5, collaborating with the Kolkata Municipal Corporation and Kolkata Primary School Council across 27 schools. Supported by educators, the initiatives benefit over 4000 students. The Educational Resource Centre leads educational content development in partnership with Bhabook and Mobile School, facilitating direct classroom interventions with face-to-face engagement.

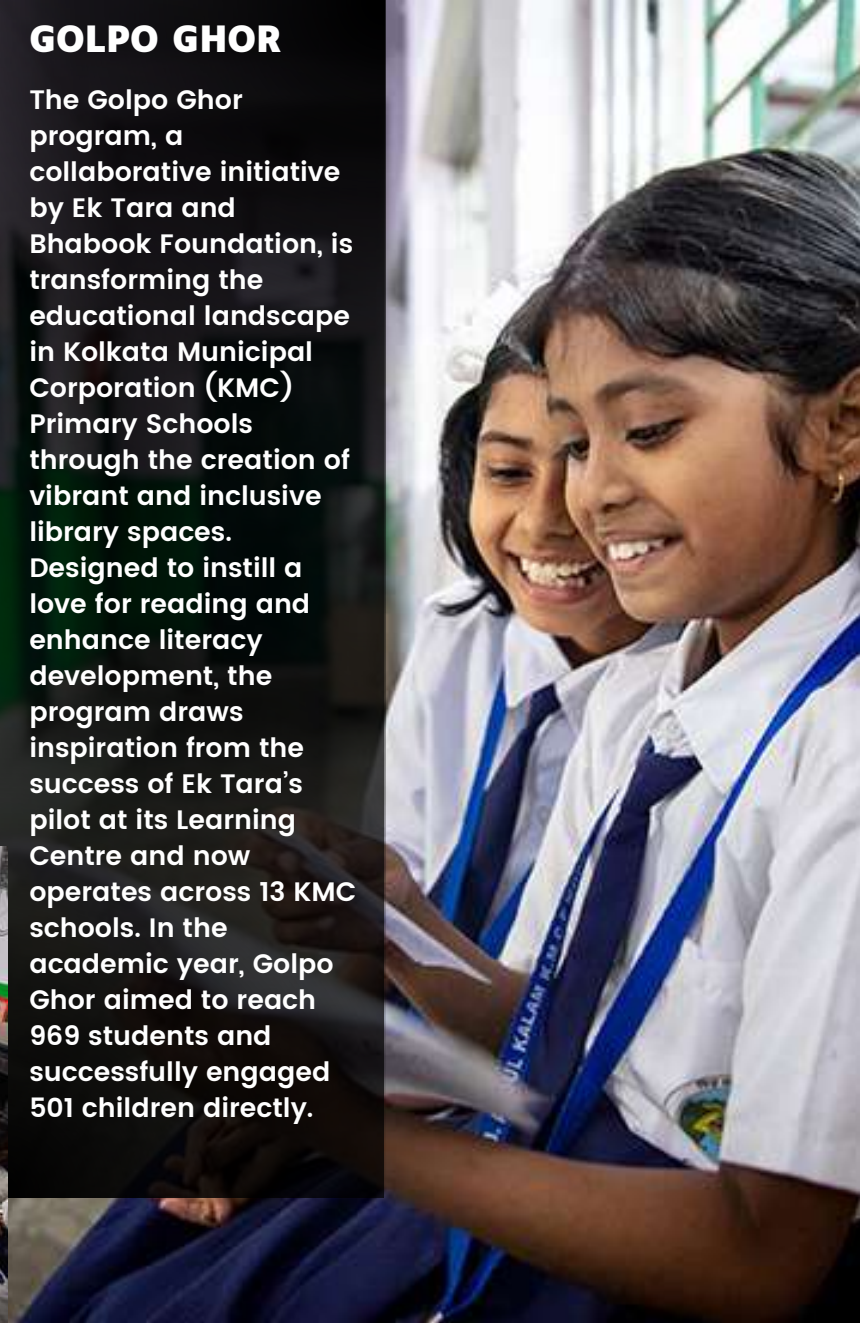
STRENGTHENING EARLY LEARNING INITIATIVES (SELI)

We are actively collaborating with primary school children across government schools in the city. Our focus will be on STEAM, library resources, foundational literacy, and numeracy. Furthermore, we aim to enhance education by offering value-added services through our mobile school project.



GOLPO GHOR

The Golpo Ghor program, a collaborative initiative by Ek Tara and Bhabook Foundation, is transforming the educational landscape in Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC) Primary Schools through the creation of vibrant and inclusive library spaces. Designed to instill a love for reading and enhance literacy development, the program draws inspiration from the success of Ek Tara's pilot at its Learning Centre and now operates across 13 KMC schools. In the academic year, Golpo Ghor aimed to reach 969 students and successfully engaged 501 children directly.



GLOBAL SCHOOLS FORUM

Global Schools Forum is a collaborative community, innovation accelerator, and partnership builder for non-state organisations working to improve education at scale for underserved children in low- and middle-income countries. We are proud to be an active member.

TEACH FOR INDIA

Ek Tara has been in a partnership with Teach for India for almost two years now. Fellows from TFI have been working at the Learning Centre in grades 3, 3, 4 and 6. The fellows work with a specific classroom for two years, investing intensively in education and the overall wellbeing of the students. The partnership not only involves working together with the fellows, but also sharing space for dialogue building and learning together.


TEAM4TECH

Since 2023, Team4Tech has been instrumental in enhancing our tech capabilities, supplying critical equipment and Adobe and Microsoft licenses. These additions have greatly improved our operations, enabling efficient workflows, and enriched our digital training programs. With access to Adobe tools, students now gain hands-on experience in design and photography, equipping them with relevant, career-ready skills that open doors in today's creative industries.

TOMORROWLAND FOUNDATION MUSIC AND ARTS SCHOOL (TLFMAS)

The Tomorrowland Foundation Music and Arts School (TLFMAS), Ek Tara was established in Dec 2022 to offer regular classes and interventions in the form of workshops and exposure activities in the overarching broad spectrum of Arts which includes Animation, Craft, Dance and Movement, Fine Arts, Vocal and Instrumental Music, DJ, EDM, Photography, Theatre and Film Screening to underprivileged children coming from disadvantaged backgrounds from Kolkata.

While the target beneficiaries include underprivileged children coming from economically disadvantaged backgrounds from the city, the current beneficiaries are largely from Ek Tara. The other beneficiaries include students from Grade 3,4,5 from Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam KMCP School.

This year we had 2 international artists spending time with the children. Alan Walker came to the centre and performed with the students as well. Nils Hoffman spent some quality time with the children as he shared his process of making music.

ANNUAL CONCERT "HURRIYYA"

The Annual Programme of 2024-25 was a grand success. Like the previous year, we had the Art Exhibition on the 2nd floor and the concert on the terrace performing area.

The Art Exhibition, titled Echoes of Art, had displays created by the students and included paintings, posters, craft works made of recycled items, stop motion and frame by frame animation, flip books, picture books, comic books, calendars, phenakistoscope, photographs, lino cuts, clay sculptures.

The final concert was no less magical. Set around the concept of Time and Space, the performance featured children aged 5 to 18. Time, personified as a narrator, guided us through a journey—of resistance, rebellion, reflection, and finally, acceptance. From dance and theatre to music and movement, the children's expressions painted a portrait of our collective struggle to define freedom within the bounds of time.

Held across two days on the terrace of the Learning Centre, over 400 guests witnessed these young stars soar. The unique circular stage radiating in four directions allowed emotions to flow freely—grief, laughter, fear, joy—each connecting deeply with the audience.

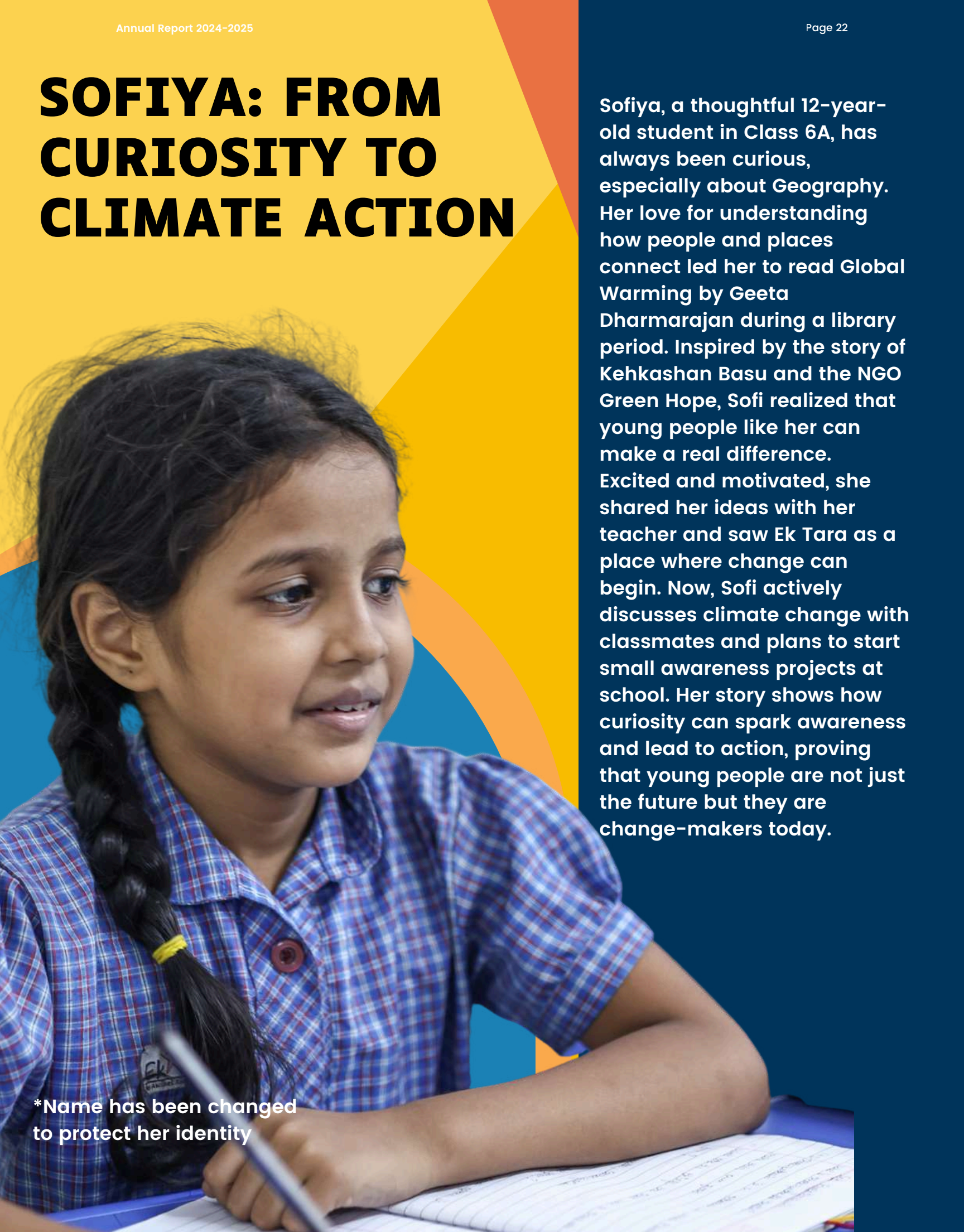

EK TARA RESOURCE CENTRE (ERC)

The Ek Tara Resource Centre (ERC) aims to enhance education quality in Ek Tara and its government school partnerships by focusing on curriculum, teacher development, and assessment systems for inclusive learning.

- ***Key points include:****
- Support for Ek Tara Learning Centre (ELC) across Early Years, Primary Years, and Higher Education Programs.
- Partnerships with government schools through the Foundational Literacy and Numeracy (FLN) program, transitioning to the Strengthening Early Learning Initiatives (SELI) by January 2025, which will include additional components like library services and STEAM education.
- In AY 2024-25, ERC trained over 45 ELC teachers and 20+ educators, emphasizing lesson planning, FLN strategies, inclusive pedagogy, and assessment.
- ERC led the academic planning for SELI, aligning frameworks with early learning goals per NEP 2020.

The SELI programme received strategic guidance from ERC, focusing on curriculum mapping, classroom observation, and assessment tool integration, with a future emphasis on data-driven instruction.



EK TARA COMMUNITY CENTRE (ECC)

The Ek Tara Community Centre is a 10,000 sq ft facility that is dedicated to programmes geared towards economic empowerment and social mobility of women.



"EK TARA CREATES"

"Ek Tara Creates" a brand that operates under Creative Ek Tara Foundation, is a social enterprise that empowers women from vulnerable backgrounds by providing large-scale tailoring services. Engaging over 35 women, it produces a variety of personal and home accessories sold through online and offline partners and exhibitions. The enterprise focuses on seasonal orders mainly in the gifting sector for corporates, weddings, and designers. In the past two years, it has collaborated with leading stores and designers and has served overseas clients.



COMMUNITY KITCHEN

Ek Tara Community Kitchen provides nutritious vegetarian meals for children at the Ek Tara Learning Centre and staff. It also offers subsidized canteen services for local factory workers and businesses. Special meals are prepared for occasions, such as Tricolour Rice with Egg Kosha for Independence Day and Egg Biryani for Children's Day, to promote happy and productive minds.

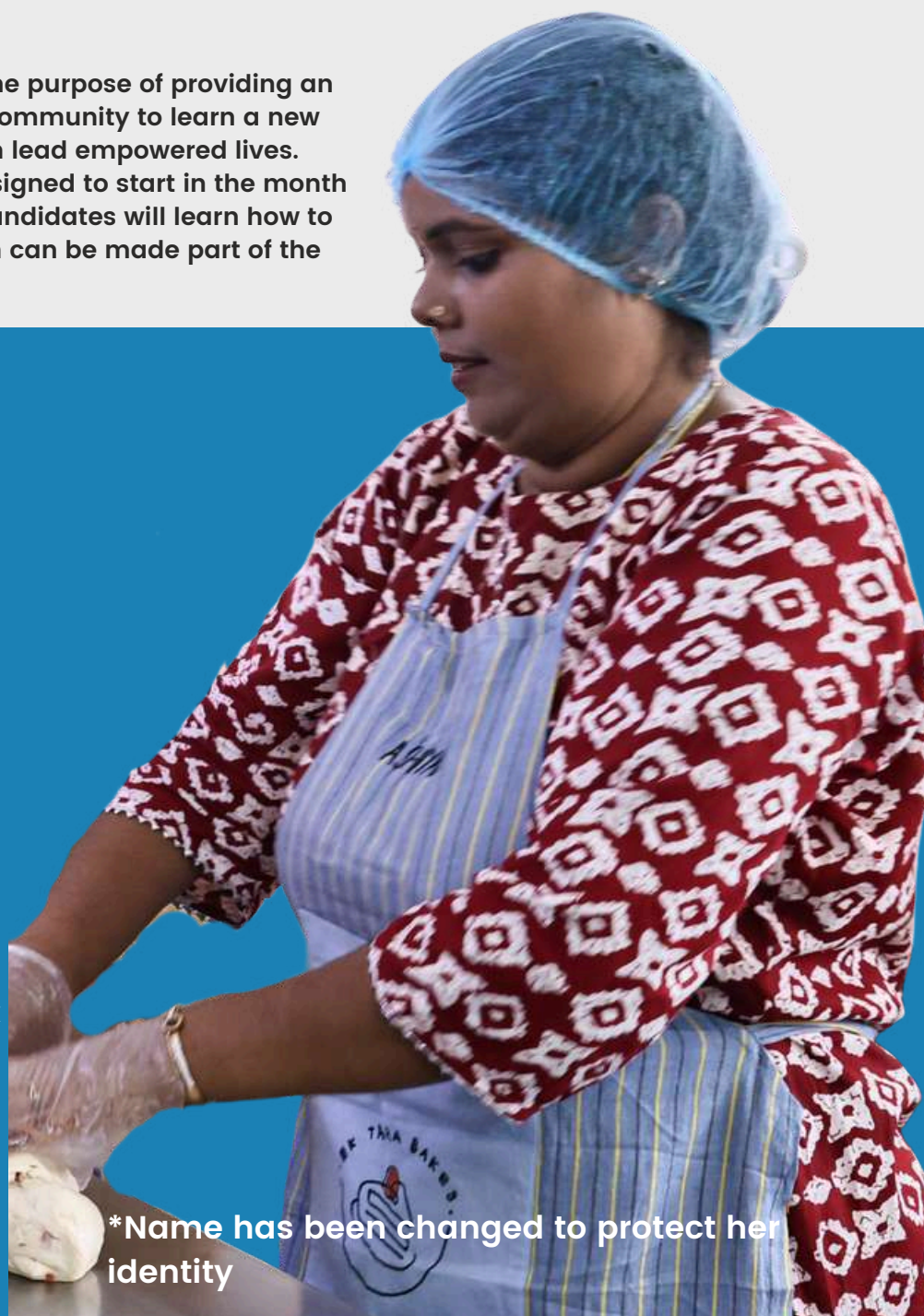


"EK TARA BAKES"

Notes forming part of the financial statements as at 31.03.2025

1 Overview of the Trust's Operations

Ek Tara ("The Trust") is registered under Section 12A A of the Income Tax Act, 1961, and holds valid registration under the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act, 2010 (FCRA) for receipt of foreign contributions. The Trust is also approved under Section 80G for donor tax benefit. A registered Trust, It was formed in 2011 and its mission is to provide high-quality holistic education to children and women of impoverished families to enable community transformation. Its aim is to enable the impoverished people to break out of the poverty enforced lack of education.

These financial statements have been prepared to comply with the ICAI Guidance Note on Financial Statements of Non-Corporate Entities (NCEs) and applicable accounting standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

2 Accounting Policy

2.1 Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost convention, using the accrual basis of accounting, except where otherwise stated, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in India

2.2 Revenue Recognition

Donations & Grants: All donations and grants received, whether general or specific-purpose, are recognised as income of the year in which they are received, in accordance with the requirements of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and audit under Rule 17B.

Unspent Specific-Purpose Grants: Any portion of donations or grants received for specific projects/programmes which remains unutilised at the end of the financial year is carried forward and disclosed as Grant Liabilities under Earmarked Funds or Unspent Project Funds. These balances represent amounts to be utilised strictly for the designated purposes in future periods.

Corpus Donations: Donations specifically received towards corpus are directly credited to the Corpus Fund and are not available for revenue expenditure.

Interest Income: Interest is recognised on an accrual basis.

Grant / Donations Accounting

All grants are accounted on receipt and expenditure and liabilities are accounted / recognised on accrual basis. Grants / donations received towards the year end and not possible to be expended within the financial year, are treated as Advance donations and necessary applications as required under the Income Tax rules for deferment of expenditure to the next financial year are made by the Trust.

Grant/ Donation Accounting on specified projects

Grants /donations accepted / received towards implementation of various programmes for carrying out specific purposes are spent according to the direction of the donor agencies and unspent balances, if any, are dealt with in accordance with the instructions/arrangement with the donor agencies. Normally the donations are received to be spent within the financial years and so they are treated as income of the year when they are received, unless they are received at the year end and treated as "Advance donation".

2.3 Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition including expenses directly attributable to bringing the asset to working condition.

All fixed assets acquired during the year are capitalised and disclosed under Property, Plant & Equipment in the Balance Sheet, irrespective of whether they are funded out of specific donations or general funds. The cost of such assets is treated as application of income under the Income Tax Act, 1961.

Fixed Assets received as donations in kind are recognised at their fair market value on the date of receipt, which is considered their deemed cost for capitalisation.

The cost/fair value of such assets is treated as application of income under section 11 of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

2.4 Depreciation

Depreciation on fixed assets is provided on the written down value (WDV) method at the rates prescribed under the Income Tax Act, 1961.

In the absence of separate internal technical estimates, the Management has determined that the rates of depreciation prescribed under the Income Tax Act, 1961 reasonably reflect the estimated useful life and usage pattern of the assets, and therefore the same rates are adopted for accounting purposes to comply with Accounting Standard (AS) 10 – Property, Plant & Equipment.

Depreciation so provided is charged to the Income & Expenditure Account annually.

It is further clarified that where the capital expenditure incurred on acquisition or construction of such assets is treated as application of income under section 11 of the Income Tax Act, 1961, the depreciation so charged in the books is not claimed again as application for tax purposes.

2.5 Disclosure and classification of expenditure

All expenditure incurred directly towards the charitable programmes of the Trust are disclosed as "Charitable Programme Expenses" and all other expenditure providing support to the programmes are disclosed under Administrative and Other expenses. All expenses are accounted for on accrual basis.

2.6 Employee benefits

- **Provident Fund & ESI:** The Trust makes regular contributions to the Provident Fund under the Employees' Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952, and the Employees' State Insurance (ESI) Scheme, as applicable. These are Defined Contribution Plans and contributions are charged to the Income & Expenditure Account on an accrual basis.
- **Gratuity:** The Trust has implemented gratuity for eligible employees under the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972. Gratuity liability is provided for and paid on actual basis. The Trust has not yet obtained an actuarial valuation as required under Accounting Standard (AS) 15 (Revised).
- **Leave Encashment:** Leave is not accumulated beyond the current financial year and is allowed to be encashed within the same financial year. Accordingly, no provision is made for leave encashment at the year-end.

2.7 Foreign Contributions

Foreign contributions are received only in designated FCRA bank accounts and utilised strictly in accordance with the FCRA, 2010 and related rules. Unutilised foreign contributions at the year-end are disclosed under Unspent FCRA Funds under Earmarked Funds.

2.8 Expenditure Classification

Expenses are classified into:

- **Charitable Programme Expenses:** Direct expenses attributable to the Trust's charitable objectives.
 - **Administrative & Other Expenses:** All other indirect expenses incurred to support the Trust's operations.
- All expenses are accounted for on accrual basis.

2.9 Unspent Project Funds

The unspent project funds disclosed under Note 3.3(c) are primarily represented by cash and bank balances net of any related project-specific liabilities, if any. These funds are restricted in nature and are required to be utilised solely for the specific purposes for which they were received, in accordance with donor conditions, Income Tax Act, and FCRA Rules. Separate bank accounts are maintained for FCRA receipts as per FCRA Rules. Non-FCRA project funds are maintained within the general bank accounts but are tracked through separate ledger heads to ensure proper utilisation.
